Develop capabilities that can be easily blended with these efforts and will require less work product / effort from any one team.

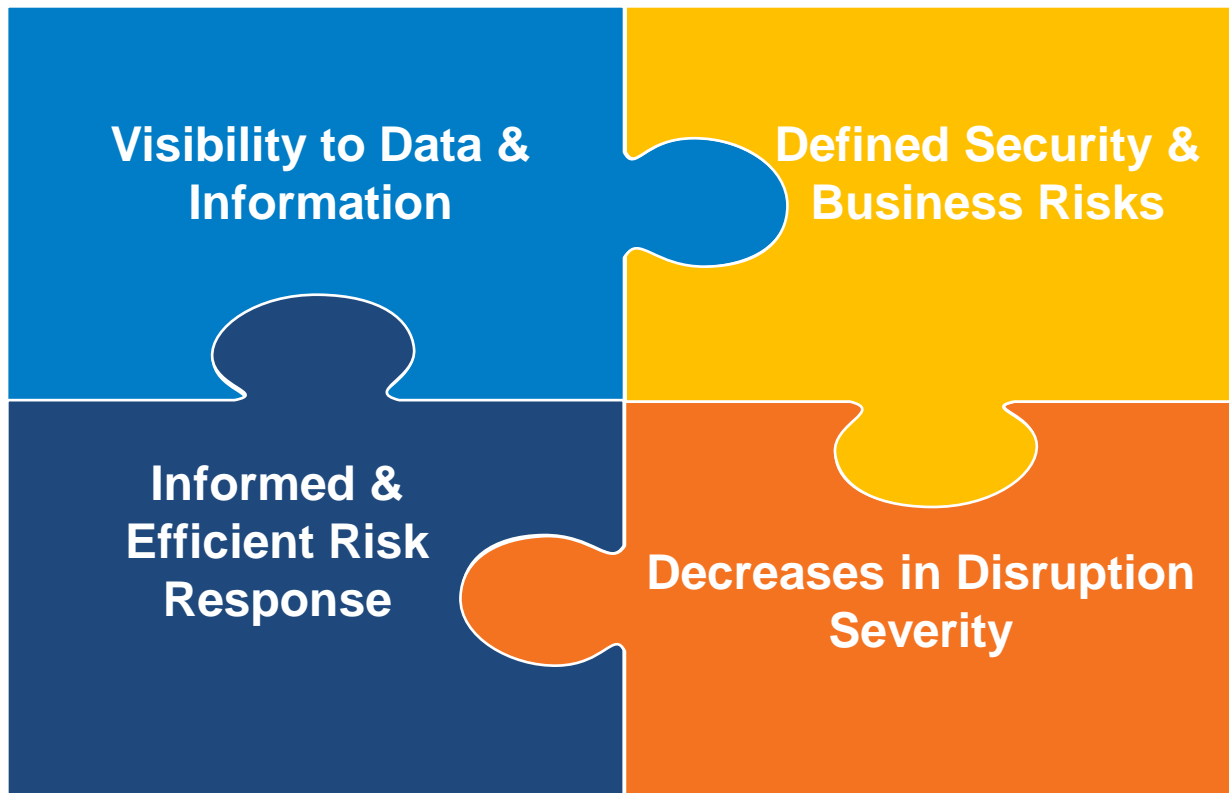
Critical needs on the Supply Chain Risk Management side that are aligned with the business operations :
